An introduction to Academic Societies

An academic society at SUBU (Students' Union Bournemouth University) is a student-led group centred around a specific subject area or field of study—such as law, psychology, media, or archaeology. These societies create a space for students to deepen their academic interests, connect with peers on the same course, and engage in activities like guest lectures, workshops, and socials. They offer both educational and social opportunities, helping students enhance their university experience beyond the classroom.

Academic societies exist on a spectrum; ranging from those that focus primarily on academic enrichment to those that take a more social approach. Some societies may organise events to support learning and career development, while others prioritise social events, trips, and informal gatherings that help students build friendships and enjoy their subject in a more relaxed setting. Many academic societies offer a balance of both, giving members the chance to grow academically while also enjoying a strong sense of community.

These clubs, like all clubs at SUBU, are created to provide a welcoming space for students to connect with like-minded people, explore their interests, and take part in fun, engaging events throughout the year.

What can you do as an Academic Society?

Our academic societies have run a huge range of activities, here are just a few examples of the things you could do with yours!

Debates & Discussions: Host panels, Q&As, or forums. It's a great way to explore ideas, learn from others, and get talking about what really matters in your subject.

Guest Speakers: Invite speakers for educational talks from an experienced professional in your field. This could be a good chance to inspire your members, provide them with extracurricular knowledge, or an opportunity to learn from a the best of the best!

Film Screenings: Screen documentaries that are connected to your field of study. Screenings can be a fun way for your members to cover key content for their course, whilst hanging out with friends

Collaborations: Team up with other societies to run fun events, socials, or projects. It's a great way to share ideas, meet new people, and try something different

Social Events: Create a space to relax with likeminded people and provide a break from the pressures of your course

Fundraising Campaigns: Whether your fundraising for a specific charity close to your hearts, or for equipment that the society needs, campaigns can be a brilliant opportunity to try out something new (potentially challenging) and bring your members together for a united cause

Trips (UK or Abroad): Trips to iconic destinations, such as museums, renowned institutions or places with a deep history connected to your academic field are a great way to travel the world with people who appreciate the same field of study. These trips can offer a deeper level of understanding and enrich your hands-on academic experience at university.
