Welcome and Introductions

3. Previous BSM Meeting Minutes and Matters Arising.

4. Motions Passed at the last BSM

People's Vote

SUBU voted to affiliate with the Peoples Vote campaign and to work with other SU's across the UK in the October BSM. Your Full-Time Officers attended a regional network to discuss how they could work more closely together to ensure that students' voices are included in these discussions. A subsequent motion was submitted to the Big Student Meeting in Feb proposing that SUBU should organise a free coach for BU students to attend the People's Vote demonstration in March, which was provided.



Plastics Policy

SUBU implemented a plastics policy at the last Big Student Meeting. Since then, no more single use cutlery has been purchased by SUBU and a wooden recyclable version is now provided instead. A 30p fee has been introduced on all disposable coffee cups to encourage students to use a reusable cup instead.

Executive Planning

SUBU voted to support Executive Planning. This meant that more was done to ensure that the Full-Time Officer's manifestos were tied into departmental work, and made sure that the Full Time Officers worked more closely together.

Since then, the FTO's have been working more closely with the departments to ensure that there is more alignment within SUBU. The Full Time Officers are also working on a joint campaign this year entitled More Than My Degree that will be launched after Christmas.

Clubs and Society funding

BU should pay for BU associated costs of sports.

We are currently talking to SportsBU and the BU Chief Operating Officer to discuss how they will fund sports clubs going forward. This is an ongoing conversation.

To change the process of how society funding is distributed.

This is linked to the above point. Further feedback (and updates) will be given during the VP Activities Officer Report.

6. Student ideas that did not get brought to the BSM

There were lots of ideas submitted to the BSM, the Executive Committee met to discuss the motions, 4 of them were not brought forward.

- 1. SUBU should press Bournemouth University to provide a link on Brightspace to SUBU under the useful links: This motion was passed in Exec and your FTO's will be working on achieving this.
- 2. Have separate bins in Halls for food waste and make it convenient for students to become more sustainable: this was deemed unfeasible at this time



due to Halls being ran by different companies, however you VP Community will take this feedback to relevant university meetings.

- 3. UniBus passes should be free for all uni students: This was deemed currently unfeasible.
- 4. **SUBU** should make single use drug testing kits available to students to minimise drug related risk: The Executive Committee felt that this was a controversial topic and more discussion needed to take place.

7. Motions.

Motion One:

SUBU should lobby BU to ensure that it becomes compulsory for academic staff to provide learning materials in advance of teaching sessions: **Proposed by: TBC -EXEC**

Not all academic staff are providing teaching materials in advance of teaching sessions. For some students, having access to teaching materials in advance is critical in providing them with equity of learning opportunity in relation to Additional Learning Requirements (ALN) and reasonable adjustments. Providing teaching materials in advance is also important for students who do not have ALN requirements; it supports pre-reading and allows for reflection and thinking ahead regarding questions to ask, potentially making the teaching session more useful overall.

Amended to: -SUBU should lobby BU to ensure that it becomes compulsory for academic staff to provide learning materials in at least 48 hours advance of teaching sessions.

For and Against:

Speaker 1. Charlotte: How do you propose to enforce this on lecturers?

Speaker 2. Lenrick Greaves VP Education: The power of the BSM is to put forward policies which are turned into motions. So we have the power of the students to lobby the university to do so.

Speaker 3: Phoebe: How far in advance would the lecturers need to do that?

Speaker 4: Rowan Bratchell: Executive Committee: I think the main thing here is that the parameters around it could be determined in the future. So we need to decide whether or not we want to put this forward and approve it. Then it will be discussed and decisions will be made about how it will be enforced.



Speaker 5. Lenrick Greaves VP Education: I disagree, I think it is up to us to decide, and I would suggest for them to be put up 2 days in advance. So we can amend this.

Speaker 3: What if this is amended to a shorter time?

Speaker 6. Jodie: I think some talks should be held with the UCU as well taking into account the strike and lectures workloads. So we need to know how this would impact them. As increased workloads is one of the reasons that lecturers are striking at the moment.

Speaker 7: Abigail: Could an amendment be attached to ensure the length of time for the material to be provided?

Speaker 5. Lenrick Greaves VP Education: We could support this with an amendment to provide learning materials in at least 48 hours advance of teaching sessions.

Proposal 2.

SUBU should lobby BU to ensure that the length of teaching days and sessions are time appropriate: Proposed by: TBC- EXEC

Currently some students have days where they have sessions which can run from 9am-7pm. This is both challenging for students and the teaching staff. Further to this some sessions can be 2-3 hours long without breaks which are difficult to concentrate in.

Amended to-

- 1. SUBU should lobby BU to ensure that the length of teaching days and sessions are time appropriate, with consultation from students.
- 2. SUBU should lobby BU to provide 5 minute breaks.

For and Against:

Speaker 1. Dan: What do you mean by long hours as a 9-5 is just like a normal job?



Speaker 2. Abigail: I have lectures, seminars etc. and these are literally back to back with no breaks. If you are doing 9 till 7 you need to ensure there are appropriate breaks.

Speaker 3: Ann Marie: How would you ensure that we all get the appropriate lecture time

Speaker 4: Kaitlin: Because of the course I was on you need that amount of time in university. It depends what course you are on, and you need to find out what hours you will be on anyway.

Speaker 2 Abigail: One of the reason the lecturers are striking is that they do 60 hour weeks. But we still need to ensure that breaks are taken.

Speaker 5: Charlotte: Some of our lecturers build in a 5 minute break, so your concentration levels can increase.

Speaker 6: Lenrick Greaves VP Education. These 2 motions seem the same, and what is meant by appropriate? For instance Nursing is fit for the industry. The amendment should reflect that it depends on what course you are doing and so discussions need to be had for each course.

Proposal 3.

SUBU should increase funding and improve the application process for societies particularly for training that would benefit them after university: Proposed by: Abigail Hartland

Amendment- SUBU should consult students when arranging its' new funding structure.

For and Against:

Speaker 1. Desmond: What is the application process? How does it work, also how can you justify the amount you get?

Speaker 2. Abigail: It's not clear for us either, we don't know what we can apply for and what we can't. Everyone says like, knitting or sports. For instance if we buy wool, doesn't this benefit the students and the society?



Speaker 3: Ann Marie: This is a statement rather than question. The way you have phrased your proposal I don't really understand. As you say increase the funding and improve the application, but as you are denied the funding why would you want to increase it, if that makes sense? Secondly, as far as first aid, as far as I'm aware there is first aid training already available, thirdly, you said other popular societies get more funding, so can you advise us on that?

Speaker 4: Abigail: I must admit I haven't been to any of these meetings, I thought it was going to be a little meeting where we would discuss it. The second point is we don't get first aid training. I am thinking of minimal money, not qualifications. So we need to consider to give more money to benefit the student and thirdly, from the statistics that we got given the sports society got a couple of thousand pounds and we got told no, because we don't want to pay for a qualification that doesn't benefit the university. Thirdly

Speaker 5. We found that funding increases when you do stuff for SUBU. From the sports side, we have quite a lot of money coming in, so say your society is only £10 to join ours is £200 so we subsidise the cost. So I am just explaining.

Speaker 6. What do you mean by improve the application form?

Speaker 2: Abigail: There could be two forms, one for large expenses and one for small expenses.

Speaker 8: If it could benefit individuals after uni it would make them well rounded.

Speaker 9. Is it about prioritising?

Speaker 2: Abigail: It's not about prioritising, I'm not saying take away from any other society, I'm just saying can you look after others as well.

Speaker 11: Nathan: How do you intend to get more funding, is it sponsorships?

Speaker 2: Abigail: it's more about the funding being more evenly distributed. Is the funding being distributed fairly, are people being ignored? I'm just saying there should be a meeting to let us know how to get funding and what we need to do to get it.

Speaker 12: Lea Ediale VP Activities: This very personal because this is what I do on a daily basis. If you know me you will know it's all about accessibility and breaking financial barriers. I'm going to address this bit by bit. There is already an update. We have had an increase in funding. I will give you an update later in my officer's report. In regard to improving this application. There was a policy that was passed this February at the last BSM, and the motion was, 1. BU should pay for BU associated costs of sports. 2. A change of how the Society funding is distributed. Therefore I do not believe that the first part of this motion is needed as it is already policy. It is also on my manifesto. You guys elected me to do this work. To give you more context, the society started working on this over the summer and then the manager left, and then someone else left and so the department was really understaffed, there was me and one other person left. I can't change the whole process by myself. Now we have appointed a new manager who is starting in January. I do understand that this needs to be sorted out. Yes sports do get more funding and it is public



knowledge. I do agree it is unfair. I have taken this forward and I am happy for there to be consultation.


